Existence Of Positive Solutions For A Class Of Kirrchoff Systems With Right Hand Side Defined As A Multiplication Of Two Separate Functions*

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Abstract

This paper deals with the study of existence of weak positive solutions for a new class of Kirrchoff parabolic systems in bounded domains with multiple parameters, where the right hand side defined as a multiplication of two separate functions.

1 Introduction

In this paper, we consider the following system of differential equations

-A\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla u|^{2} dx\right) \Delta u + u_{t} = \lambda_{1} \alpha\left(x\right) f\left(v\right) h\left(u\right) \text{ in } Q_{T}, \\
-B\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla v|^{2} dx\right) \Delta v + v_{t} = \lambda_{2} \beta\left(x\right) g\left(u\right) \tau\left(v\right) \text{ in } Q_{T}, \\
u = v = 0 \text{ on } \partial Q_{T}, \ u\left(x,0\right) = \varphi\left(x\right),
\end{cases} \tag{1}$$

where $Q_T = \Omega \times [0,T]$, $\Omega \subset \mathbb{R}^N$ $(N \geq 3)$ is a bounded smooth domain with C^2 boundary $\partial \Omega$, and $A, B : \mathbb{R}^+ \to \mathbb{R}^+$ are continuous functions, $\alpha, \beta \in C(\overline{\Omega})$, λ_1 and λ_2 are nonnegative parameters.

Since the first equation in (1) contains an integral over Ω , it is no longer a pointwise identity; therefore it is often called nonlocal problem. This problem models several physical and biological systems, where u describes a process which depends on the

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average of itself, such as the population density, see [7]. Moreover, problem (1) is related to the stationary version of the Kirchhoff equation

$$\rho \frac{\partial^2 u}{\partial t^2} - \left(\frac{P_0}{h} + \frac{E}{2L} \int_0^L \left| \frac{\partial u}{\partial x} \right|^2 dx \right) \frac{\partial^2 u}{\partial x^2} = 0 \tag{2}$$

presented by Kirchhoff in 1883, see [17]. This equation is an extension of the classical d'Alembert's wave equation by considering the effect of the changes in the length of the string during the vibrations. The parameters in (2) have the following meanings: L is the length of the string, h is the area of the cross-section, E is the Young modulus of the material, ρ is the mass density, and P_0 is the initial tension.

By using Euler time scheme on (1), we obtain the following problems

$$\begin{cases} -\tau' A \left(\int_{\Omega} \left| \nabla u_k \right|^2 dx \right) \triangle u_k + u_k = \tau' \left[\lambda_1 \alpha \left(x \right) f \left(v_k \right) h \left(u_k \right) \right] + u_{k-1} \text{ in } Q_T, \\ -\tau' B \left(\int_{\Omega} \left| \nabla v \right|^2 dx \right) \triangle v + v_k = \tau' \left[\lambda_2 \beta \left(x \right) g \left(u \right) \tau \left(v \right) \right] + v_{k-1} \text{ in } Q_T, \\ u_k = v_k = 0 \text{ on } \partial Q_T, \\ u \left(x, 0 \right) = \varphi \left(x \right) \end{cases}$$

where $N\tau' = T$, 0 < T < 1, and for $1 \le k \le N$.

In recent years, problems involving Kirchhoff type operators have been studied in many papers, we refer to ([2], [4], [7], [8], [14], [18]), in which the authors have used different methods to get the existence of solutions for Kirchhoff type equations. Our paper is motivated by the recent results in ([1], [3]). In the paper [3], Azzouz and Bensedik studied the existence of a positive weak solution for the nonlocal problem of the form

where Ω is a bounded smooth domain in \mathbb{R}^N , $N \geq 3$ and p > 1, with a sign-changing function f.

Using the sub-supersolution method combining a comparison principle introduced in [1], the authors established the existence of a positive solution for (3), where the parameter $\lambda > 0$ is small enough. In the present paper, we consider system (1) in the case when the nonlinearities are "sublinear" at infinity, see the condition (H3). Under suitable conditions on f, g, h and τ , we shall show that system (1) has a positive solution for $\lambda > \lambda^*$ large enough. To our best knowledge, this is a new research topic for nonlocal problems, see [12]. In current paper, motivated by previous works in ([3], [9]) and by using sub-super solutions method, we study of existence of weak positive solutions for a new class of Kirrchoff parabolic systems in bounded domains with multiple parameters, with the right hand side defined as a multiplication of two separate functions. Our results extend and improve our recent results in [4] and [18].

2 Existence Results

LEMMA 1 ([3]). Assume that $M: \mathbb{R}^+ \to \mathbb{R}^+$ is a continuous and nonincreasing function satisfying

where m_0 is a positive constant. Suppose further that function $H(t) := tM(t^2)$ is increasing on \mathbb{R} . Assume that u, v are two non-negative functions such that

-M\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla u|^2 dx\right) \Delta u \ge -M\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla v|^2 dx\right) \Delta v \text{ in } \Omega, \\
u = v = 0 \text{ on } \partial\Omega.
\end{cases}$$

Then $u \geq v$ a.e. in Ω .

LEMMA 2 ([1]). If M verifies the conditions of Lemma 1, then for each $f \in L^2(\Omega)$, there exists a unique solution $u \in H_0^1(\Omega)$ to the M-linear problem

$$-M\left(\int\limits_{\Omega}\left|\nabla u\right|^{2}dx\right)\Delta u=f\left(x\right) \text{ in }\Omega \text{ and }u=0 \text{ in }\partial\Omega.$$

LEMMA 3 ([15]). Let w solve $\Delta w = g$ in Ω . If $g \in C(\Omega)$, then $w \in C^{1,\alpha}(\Omega)$ for any $\alpha \in (0,1)$. In particular, w is continuous in Ω .

In this section, we shall state and prove the main result of this paper. Let us make the following assumptions:

(H1) $A, B : \mathbb{R}^+ \to \mathbb{R}^+$ satisfy the same conditions as M in Lemma 1, and there exist $a_i, b_i > 0, i = 1, 2$, such that

$$a_1 \leq A(t) \leq a_2, \ b_1 \leq B(t) \leq b_2 \text{ for all } t \in \mathbb{R}^+.$$

(H2) $\alpha, \beta \in C(\overline{\Omega})$ and

$$\alpha(x) \ge \alpha_0 > 0, \quad \beta(x) \ge \beta_0 > 0$$

for all $x \in \Omega$.

(H3) f, g, h and τ are increasing and continuously differentiable functions on $(0, +\infty)$ such that

$$\lim_{t\to +\infty}f\left(t\right)=+\infty,\quad \lim_{t\to +\infty}g\left(t\right)=+\infty,\quad \lim_{t\to +\infty}h\left(t\right)=+\infty=\lim_{t\to +\infty}\tau\left(t\right)=+\infty.$$

(H4) $\exists \gamma > 0$ such that

$$\lim_{t\rightarrow+\infty}\frac{h\left(t\right)f\left(k\left[g\left(t\right)^{\gamma}\right]\right)}{t}=0\ \ \text{and}\ \lim_{t\rightarrow+\infty}\frac{\tau\left(kt^{\gamma}\right)}{t^{\gamma-1}}=0\ \text{for all}\ k>0.$$

We may show below an example where hypotheses (H3) and (H4) hold where

$$\tau(t) = \ln(t), \quad h(t) = \sqrt{t}, \quad f(t) = \ln(t), \quad g(t) = t, \quad \gamma = 2.$$

THEOREM 1. Assume that the conditions (H1)–(H4) hold. Then for large $\lambda_1\alpha_0$ and $\lambda_2\beta_0$, problem (1) has a large positive weak solution.

We give the following two definitions before we give our main result.

DEFINITION 1. $(u, v) \in (H_0^1(\Omega) \times H_0^1(\Omega))$ is said to be a weak solution of (1) if it satisfies

$$A\left(\int_{\Omega} \left|\nabla u_{k}\right|^{2} dx\right) \int_{\Omega} \nabla u_{k} \nabla \phi dx = \lambda_{1} \int_{\Omega} \left[\alpha\left(x\right) f\left(v\right) h\left(u\right) - \frac{u_{k} - u_{k-1}}{\tau'}\right] \phi dx \text{ in } \Omega,$$

$$B\left(\int_{\Omega} \left|\nabla v_{k}\right|^{2} dx\right) \int_{\Omega} \nabla v_{k} \nabla \psi dx = \lambda_{2} \int_{\Omega} \left[\beta\left(x\right) g\left(u_{k}\right) \tau\left(v_{k}\right) - \frac{v_{k} - v_{k-1}}{\tau'}\right] \psi dx \text{ in } \Omega$$
for all $(\phi, \psi) \in \left(H_{0}^{1}(\Omega) \times H_{0}^{1}(\Omega)\right)$.

DEFINITION 2. Pairs of nonnegative functions $(\underline{u}_k, \underline{v}_k)$, $(\overline{u}_k, \overline{v}_k)$ in $(H_0^1(\Omega) \times H_0^1(\Omega))$ are called a weak subsolution and supersolution pair of (1) if

$$(\underline{u}_{k}, \underline{v}_{k}) = (\overline{u}_{k}, \overline{v}_{k}) = (0, 0) \text{ on } \partial\Omega,$$

$$\left\{ \begin{array}{l} A\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla \underline{u}_{k}|^{2} dx\right) \int_{\Omega} \nabla \underline{u}_{k} \nabla \phi \ \mathrm{d}x \leq \lambda_{1} \int_{\Omega} \left[\alpha\left(x\right) f\left(\underline{v}_{k}\right) h\left(\underline{u}_{k}\right) - \frac{u_{k} - u_{k-1}}{\tau'}\right] \phi \ \mathrm{d}x \text{ in } \Omega, \\ B\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla \underline{v}_{k}|^{2} dx\right) \int_{\Omega} \nabla \underline{v}_{k} \nabla \psi \ \mathrm{d}x \leq \lambda_{2} \int_{\Omega} \left[\beta\left(x\right) g\left(\underline{u}_{k}\right) \tau\left(\underline{v}_{k}\right) - \frac{v_{k} - v_{k-1}}{\tau'}\right] \psi \ \mathrm{d}x \text{ in } \Omega \end{array} \right.$$
and
$$\left\{ \begin{array}{l} A\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla \overline{u}_{k}|^{2} dx\right) \int_{\Omega} \nabla \overline{u}_{k} \nabla \phi \ \mathrm{d}x \geq \lambda_{1} \int_{\Omega} \left[\alpha\left(x\right) f\left(\overline{v}_{k}\right) h\left(\overline{u}_{k}\right) - \frac{u_{k} - u_{k-1}}{\tau'}\right] \phi \ \mathrm{d}x \text{ in } \Omega, \\ \left. B\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla \overline{v}_{k}|^{2} dx\right) \int_{\Omega} \nabla \overline{v}_{k} \nabla \psi \ \mathrm{d}x \geq \lambda_{2} \int_{\Omega} \left[\beta\left(x\right) g\left(\overline{u}_{k}\right) \tau\left(\overline{v}_{k}\right) - \frac{v_{k} - v_{k-1}}{\tau'}\right] \psi \ \mathrm{d}x \text{ in } \Omega \right. \right.$$
for all $(\phi, \psi) \in \left(H_{0}^{1}\left(\Omega\right) \times H_{0}^{1}\left(\Omega\right)\right)$.

PROOF OF THEOREM 1. Let σ be the first eigenvalue of $-\Delta$ with Dirichlet boundary conditions and ϕ_1 the corresponding positive eigenfunction with $\|\phi_1\|=1$. Let $m_0, \delta>0$ be such that $|\nabla \phi_1|^2-\sigma\phi_1^2\geq m_0$ on $\overline{\Omega}_\delta=\{x\in\Omega:d(x,\partial\Omega)\leq\delta\}$. For each $\lambda_1\alpha_0$ and $\lambda_2\beta_0$ large, let us define

$$\underline{u}_k = \left(\frac{\lambda_1 \alpha_0}{2a_1}\right) \phi_1^2 \text{ and } \underline{v}_k = \left(\frac{\lambda_2 \beta_0}{2b_1}\right) \phi_1^2,$$

where a_1, b_1 are given by the condition (H1). We shall verify that $(\underline{u}, \underline{v})$ is a weak subsolution of problem (1) for $\lambda_1 \alpha_0$ and $\lambda_2 \beta_0$ large enough. Indeed, let $\phi \in H_0^1(\Omega)$ with $\phi \geq 0$ in Ω . By (H1)–(H3), a simple calculation shows that

$$\begin{split} &A\left(\int\limits_{\Omega}\left|\nabla\underline{u}_{k}\right|^{2}dx\right)\int\limits_{\overline{\Omega}_{\delta}}\nabla\underline{u}_{k}.\nabla\phi dx\\ &=A\left(\int\limits_{\Omega}\left|\nabla\underline{u}_{k}\right|^{2}dx\right)\frac{\lambda_{1}\alpha_{0}}{a_{1}}\int\limits_{\overline{\Omega}_{\delta}}\phi_{1}\nabla\phi_{1}.\nabla\phi dx\\ &=\frac{\lambda_{1}\alpha_{0}}{a_{1}}A\left(\int\limits_{\Omega}\left|\nabla\underline{u}_{k}\right|^{2}dx\right)\left\{\int\limits_{\overline{\Omega}_{\delta}}\nabla\phi_{1}\nabla\left(\phi_{1}.\phi\right)dx-\int\limits_{\overline{\Omega}_{\delta}}\left|\nabla\phi_{1}\right|^{2}\phi dx\right\}\\ &=\frac{\lambda_{1}\alpha_{0}}{a_{1}}A\left(\int\limits_{\Omega}\left|\nabla\underline{u}_{k}\right|^{2}dx\right)\int\limits_{\overline{\Omega}_{\delta}}\left(\sigma\phi_{1}^{2}-\left|\nabla\phi_{1}\right|^{2}\right)\phi dx. \end{split}$$

On $\overline{\Omega}_{\delta}$, we have $|\nabla \phi_1|^2 - \sigma \phi_1^2 \ge m_0$. Then $\sigma \phi_1^2 - |\nabla \phi_1|^2 < 0$. So

$$A\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla \underline{u}_{k}|^{2} dx\right) \int_{\overline{\Omega}_{\delta}} \nabla \underline{u}_{k} \nabla \phi dx < 0.$$

Under (H3) for $\lambda_1 \alpha_0$ and $\lambda_2 \beta_0$ large enough, we get $f(\underline{v}_k) h(\underline{u}_k) > 0$. Then

$$A\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla \underline{u}_{k}|^{2} dx\right) \int_{\overline{\Omega}_{\delta}} \nabla \underline{u}_{k} \nabla \phi dx$$

$$\leq \lambda_{1} \int_{\overline{\Omega}_{\delta}} \alpha(x) f(\underline{v}_{k}) h(\underline{u}_{k}) \phi dx$$

$$\leq \lambda_{1} \int_{\overline{\Omega}_{\delta}} \left[\alpha(x) f(\underline{v}_{k}) h(\underline{u}_{k}) - \frac{u_{k} - u_{k-1}}{\tau'} \right] \phi dx. \tag{6}$$

Next, on $\Omega \setminus \overline{\Omega}_{\delta}$, we have $\phi_1 \geq r$ for some r > 0, and therefore by the conditions

(H1)–(H3) and the definition of \underline{u} and \underline{v} , it follows that

$$\lambda_{1} \int_{\Omega \setminus \overline{\Omega}_{\delta}} \left[\alpha(x) f(\underline{v}_{k}) h(\underline{u}_{k}) - \frac{u_{k} - u_{k-1}}{\tau'} \right] \phi dx$$

$$\geq \frac{\lambda_{1} \alpha_{0} a_{2}}{a_{1}} \sigma \int_{\Omega \setminus \overline{\Omega}_{\delta}} \phi dx$$

$$\geq \frac{\lambda_{1} \alpha_{0}}{a_{1}} A \left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla \underline{u}_{k}|^{2} dx \right) \int_{\Omega \setminus \overline{\Omega}_{\delta}} \sigma \phi dx$$

$$\geq \frac{\lambda_{1} \alpha_{0}}{a_{1}} A \left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla \underline{u}_{k}|^{2} dx \right) \int_{\Omega \setminus \overline{\Omega}_{\delta}} \left(\sigma \phi_{1}^{2} - |\nabla \phi_{1}|^{2} \right) \phi dx$$

$$= A \left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla \underline{u}_{k}|^{2} dx \right) \int_{\Omega \setminus \overline{\Omega}_{\delta}} \nabla \underline{u}_{k} \nabla \phi dx \tag{7}$$

for $\lambda_1 \alpha_0 > 0$ large enough.

Relations (6) and (7) imply that

$$A\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla \underline{u}_{k}|^{2} dx\right) \int_{\Omega} \nabla \underline{u}_{k} \nabla \phi dx$$

$$\leq \lambda_{1} \int_{\Omega} \left[\alpha(x) f(\underline{v}_{k}) h(\underline{u}_{k}) - \frac{u_{k} - u_{k-1}}{\tau'}\right] \phi dx \text{ in } \Omega$$
(8)

for $\lambda_1 \alpha_0 > 0$ large enough and any $\phi \in H_0^1(\Omega)$ with $\phi \geq 0$ in Ω . Similarly,

$$B\left(\int_{\Omega} \left|\nabla \underline{v}\right|^{2} dx\right) \int_{\Omega} \nabla \underline{v} \nabla \psi dx \leq \lambda_{2} \int_{\Omega} \left[\beta\left(x\right) g\left(\underline{u}\right) \tau\left(\underline{v}\right) - \frac{v_{k} - v_{k-1}}{\tau'}\right] \psi dx \text{ in } \Omega \quad (9)$$

for $\lambda_2\beta_0 > 0$ large enough and any $\psi \in H_0^1(\Omega)$ with $\psi \geq 0$ in Ω . From (8) and (9), $(\underline{u}_k,\underline{v}_k)$ is a subsolution of problem (1). Moreover, we have $\underline{u}_k > 0$ and $\underline{v}_k > 0$ in Ω , $\underline{u}_k \to +\infty$ and $\underline{v}_k \to +\infty$ as $\lambda_1\alpha_0 \to +\infty$ and $\lambda_2\beta_0 \to +\infty$.

Next, we shall construct a weak supersolution of problem (1). Let e be the solution of the following problem

-\Delta e = 1 \text{ in } \Omega, \\
e = 0 \text{ on } \partial \Omega.
\end{cases}$$
(10)

Let

$$\overline{u_k} = Ce, \ \overline{v}_k = \left(\frac{\lambda_2 \|\beta\|_{\infty}}{b_1}\right) \left[g\left(C \|e\|_{\infty}\right)\right]^{\gamma} e,$$

where γ is given by (H4) and C > 0 is a large positive real number to be chosen later. We shall verify that $(\overline{u}_k, \overline{v}_k)$ is a supersolution of problem (1). Let $\phi \in H_0^1(\Omega)$ with $\phi \geq 0$ in Ω . Then we obtain from (10) and the condition (H1) that

$$A\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla \overline{u}_{k}|^{2} dx\right) \int_{\Omega} \nabla \overline{u}_{k} \cdot \nabla \phi dx = A\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla \overline{u}_{k}|^{2} dx\right) C \int_{\Omega} \nabla e \nabla \phi dx$$
$$= A\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla \overline{u}_{k}|^{2} dx\right) C \int_{\Omega} \phi dx$$
$$\geq a_{1} C \int_{\Omega} \phi dx.$$

By (H4), we can choose C large enough so that

$$a_1 C \ge \lambda_1 \|\alpha\|_{\infty} f\left(\frac{\lambda_2 \|\beta\|_{\infty}}{b_1} \|e\|_{\infty} [g(C \|e\|_{\infty})]^{\gamma}\right) h(C \|e\|_{\infty}).$$

Therefore,

$$A\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla \overline{u}_{k}|^{2} dx\right) \int_{\Omega} \nabla \overline{u}_{k} \cdot \nabla \phi dx$$

$$\geq \lambda_{1} \|\alpha\|_{\infty} f\left(\frac{\lambda_{2} \|\beta\|_{\infty}}{b_{1}} \|e\|_{\infty} [g(C\|e\|_{\infty})]^{\gamma}\right)$$

$$\times h(C\|e\|_{\infty}) \int_{\Omega} \phi dx - \int_{\Omega} \frac{u_{k} - u_{k-1}}{\tau'} \phi dx$$

$$\geq \lambda_{1} \int_{\Omega} \alpha(x) f(\overline{v}_{k}) h(\overline{u}_{k}) \phi dx - \int_{\Omega} \frac{u_{k} - u_{k-1}}{\tau'} \phi dx. \tag{11}$$

Also, we have

$$B\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla \overline{v}_{k}|^{2} dx\right) \int_{\Omega} \nabla \overline{v_{k}} \nabla \psi dx \ge \lambda_{2} \|\beta\|_{\infty} \int_{\Omega} \left[g\left(C \|e\|_{\infty}\right)\right]^{\gamma} \psi dx. \tag{12}$$

Again by (H4) for C large enough, we have

$$[g(C \|e\|_{\infty})]^{\gamma} \ge g(C \|e\|_{\infty}) \tau \left(\frac{\lambda_2 \|\beta\|_{\infty} \|e\|_{\infty}}{b_1} [g(C \|e\|_{\infty})]^{\gamma}\right).$$
 (13)

From (12) and (13), we have

$$B\left(\int_{\Omega} \left|\nabla \overline{v_k}\right|^2 dx\right) \int_{\Omega} \nabla \overline{v}_k \nabla \psi dx \ge \lambda_2 \int_{\Omega} \left[\beta\left(x\right)g\left(\overline{u_k}\right)\tau\left(\overline{v_k}\right) - \frac{v_k - v_{k-1}}{\tau'}\right] \psi dx. \quad (14)$$

From (11) and (14), we have $(\overline{u}_k, \overline{v}_k)$ is a weak supersolution of problem (1) with $\underline{u}_k \leq \overline{u}_k$ and $\underline{v}_k \leq \overline{v}_k$ for C large.

In order to obtain a weak solution of problem (1) we define the sequence

$$\{(u_n, v_n)\}\subset E=\left(H_0^1(\Omega)\times H_0^1(\Omega)\right)\cap (C(\Omega)\times C(\Omega))$$

as follows: $(u_0, v_0) := (\overline{u}_k, \overline{v}_k) \in E$ and (u_n, v_n) is the unique solution of the system

$$\begin{cases}
-A\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla u_{n}|^{2} dx\right) \Delta u_{n} = \lambda_{1} \alpha\left(x\right) f\left(v_{n-1}\right) h\left(u_{n-1}\right) - \frac{u_{k} - u_{k-1}}{\tau'} & \text{in } \Omega, \\
-B\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla v_{n}|^{2} dx\right) \Delta v_{n} = \lambda_{2} \beta\left(x\right) g\left(u_{n-1}\right) \tau\left(v_{n-1}\right) - \frac{v_{k} - v_{k-1}}{\tau'} & \text{in } \Omega, \\
u_{n} = v_{n} = 0 & \text{on } \partial\Omega.
\end{cases}$$
(15)

Problem (15) is (A, B)-linear in the sense that, if $(u_{n-1}, v_{n-1}) \in E$ is a given, the right hand sides of (15) is independent of u_n, v_n .

Set $\widetilde{A}(t) = tA(t^2)$, $\widetilde{B}(t) = tB(t^2)$. Then since $\widetilde{A}(\mathbb{R}) = \mathbb{R}$, $\widetilde{B}(\mathbb{R}) = \mathbb{R}$, $f(v_0)$, $h(u_0)$, $g(u_0)$ and $\tau(v_0) \in C(\Omega) \subset L^2(\Omega)$ (in x), we deduce from Lemma 2 that system (15) with n = 1 has a unique solution $(u_1, v_1) \in (H_0^1(\Omega) \times H_0^1(\Omega))$.

And by observing that

$$\begin{cases}
-A\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla u_{1}|^{2} dx\right) \Delta u_{1} = \lambda_{1} \alpha f\left(v_{0}\right) h\left(u_{0}\right) - \frac{u_{k} - u_{k-1}}{\tau'} \in C\left(\Omega\right), \\
-B\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla v_{1}|^{2} dx\right) \Delta v_{1} = \lambda_{2} \beta g\left(u_{0}\right) \tau\left(v_{0}\right) - \frac{v_{k} - v_{k-1}}{\tau'} \in C\left(\Omega\right), \\
u_{1} = v_{1} = 0 \text{ on } \partial\Omega.
\end{cases}$$

We deduce from Lemma 3 that $(u_1, v_1) \in C(\Omega) \times C(\Omega)$. Consequently $(u_1, v_1) \in E$. By the same way we construct the following elements $(u_n, v_n) \in E$ of our sequence.

From (15) and the fact that (u_0, v_0) is a weak supersolution of (1), we have

$$\begin{cases}
-A\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla u_{0}|^{2} dx\right) \Delta u_{0} \geq \lambda_{1} \alpha\left(x\right) f\left(v_{0}\right) h\left(u_{0}\right) = -A\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla u_{1}|^{2} dx\right) \Delta u_{1}, \\
-B\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla v_{0}|^{2} dx\right) \Delta v_{0} \geq \lambda_{2} \beta\left(x\right) g\left(u_{0}\right) \tau\left(v_{0}\right) = -B\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla v_{1}| dx\right) \Delta v_{1}
\end{cases}$$

and by using Lemma 1, $u_0 \ge u_1$ and $v_0 \ge v_1$. Also, since $u_0 \ge \underline{u}_k$, $v_0 \ge \underline{v}_k$ and the

monotonicity of f, h, g, and τ , one has

$$-A\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla u_{1}|^{2} dx\right) \Delta u_{1} = \lambda_{1} \alpha(x) f(v_{0}) h(u_{0}) - \frac{u_{k} - u_{k-1}}{\tau'}$$

$$\geq \lambda_{1} \alpha(x) f(\underline{v}_{k}) h(\underline{u}_{k}) - \frac{u_{k} - u_{k-1}}{\tau'}$$

$$\geq -A\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla \underline{u}_{k}|^{2} dx\right) \Delta \underline{u}_{k},$$

$$-B\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla v_{1}|^{2} dx\right) \triangle v_{1} = \lambda_{2}\beta\left(x\right)g\left(u_{0}\right)\tau\left(v_{0}\right) - \frac{v_{k} - v_{k-1}}{\tau'}$$

$$\geq \lambda_{2}\beta\left(x\right)g\left(\underline{u}_{k}\right)\tau\left(\underline{v}_{k}\right) - \frac{v_{k} - v_{k-1}}{\tau'}$$

$$\geq -B\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla \underline{v}_{k}|^{2} dx\right) \triangle \underline{v}_{k},$$

from which, according to Lemma 1, $u_1 \geq \underline{u}_k$, $v_1 \geq \underline{v}_k$ for u_2, v_2 , we write

$$-A\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla u_{1}|^{2} dx\right) \triangle u_{1} = \lambda_{1} \alpha\left(x\right) f\left(v_{0}\right) h\left(u_{0}\right) - \frac{u_{k} - u_{k-1}}{\tau'}$$

$$\geq \lambda_{1} \alpha\left(x\right) f\left(v_{1}\right) h\left(u_{1}\right) - \frac{u_{k} - u_{k-1}}{\tau'}$$

$$= -A\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla u_{2}|^{2} dx\right) \triangle u_{2},$$

$$-B\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla v_{1}| dx\right) \triangle v_{1} = \lambda_{2}\beta\left(x\right)g\left(u_{0}\right)\tau\left(v_{0}\right) - \frac{v_{k} - v_{k-1}}{\tau'}$$

$$\geq \lambda_{2}\beta\left(x\right)g\left(u_{1}\right)\tau\left(v_{1}\right) - \frac{v_{k} - v_{k-1}}{\tau'}$$

$$= -B\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla v_{2}|^{2} dx\right) \triangle v_{2},$$

and then $u_1 \geq u_2, \, v_1 \geq v_2$. Similarly, $u_2 \geq \underline{u}_k$ and $v_2 \geq \underline{v}_k$. Because

$$-A\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla u_{2}|^{2} dx\right) \Delta u_{2} = \lambda_{1} \alpha\left(x\right) f\left(v_{1}\right) h\left(u_{1}\right) - \frac{u_{k} - u_{k-1}}{\tau'}$$

$$\geq \lambda_{1} \alpha\left(x\right) f\left(\underline{v}_{k}\right) h\left(\underline{u}_{k}\right) - \frac{u_{k} - u_{k-1}}{\tau'}$$

$$\geq -A\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla \underline{u}_{k}|^{2} dx\right) \Delta \underline{u}_{k},$$

$$-B\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla v_{2}|^{2} dx\right) \triangle v_{2} = \lambda_{2}\beta\left(x\right)g\left(u_{1}\right)\tau\left(v_{1}\right) - \frac{v_{k} - v_{k-1}}{\tau'}$$

$$\geq \lambda_{2}\beta\left(x\right)g\left(\underline{u}_{k}\right)\tau\left(\underline{v}_{k}\right) - \frac{v_{k} - v_{k-1}}{\tau'}$$

$$\geq -B\left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla \underline{v}_{k}|^{2} dx\right) \triangle \underline{v}_{k}.$$

Repeating this argument we get a bounded monotone sequence $\{(u_n, v_n)\}\subset E$ satisfying

$$\overline{u}_k = u_0 \ge u_1 \ge u_2 \ge \dots \ge u_n \ge \dots \ge \underline{u}_k > 0 \tag{16}$$

and

$$\overline{v}_k = v_0 \ge v_1 \ge v_2 \ge \dots \ge v_n \ge \dots \ge \underline{v}_k > 0. \tag{17}$$

By using the continuity of the functions f, h, g and τ and the definition of the sequences $\{u_n\}$, $\{v_n\}$, there exist constants $C_i > 0$, i = 1, ..., 4 independent of n such that

$$|f(v_{n-1})| \le C_1, \quad |h(u_{n-1})| \le C_2, \ |g(u_{n-1})| \le C_3$$
 (18)

and

$$|\tau(u_{n-1})| \leq C_4$$
 for all n .

From (18), multiplying the first equation of (15) by u_n , integrating, using the Hölder

inequality and Sobolev embedding, we can show that

$$a_{1} \int_{\Omega} |\nabla u_{n}|^{2} dx \leq A \left(\int_{\Omega} |\nabla u_{n}|^{2} dx \right) \int_{\Omega} |\nabla u_{n}|^{2} dx$$

$$= \lambda_{1} \int_{\Omega} \alpha (x) f (v_{n-1}) h (u_{n-1}) u_{n} dx - \int_{\Omega} \frac{u_{k} - u_{k-1}}{\tau'} u_{n} dx$$

$$\leq \lambda_{1} \|\alpha\|_{\infty} \int_{\Omega} |f (v_{n-1})| |h (u_{n-1})| |u_{n}| dx - \int_{\Omega} \frac{u_{k} - u_{k-1}}{\tau'} |u_{n}| dx$$

$$\leq C_{1} C_{2} \|\alpha\|_{\infty} \lambda_{1} \int_{\Omega} |u_{n}| dx - \int_{\Omega} \frac{u_{k} - u_{k-1}}{\tau'} |u_{n}| dx$$

$$\leq C_{1} \|u_{n}\|_{H_{0}^{1}(\Omega)}.$$

Then

$$||u_n||_{H_0^1(\Omega)} \le C_5, \ \forall n,$$
 (19)

where $C_5 > 0$ is a constant independent of n. Similarly, there exists $C_6 > 0$ independent of n such that

$$||v_n||_{H_0^1(\Omega)} \le C_6, \quad \forall n. \tag{20}$$

From (19) and (20), we infer that $\{(u_n, v_n)\}$ has a subsequence which weakly converges in $H_0^1(\Omega, \mathbb{R}^2)$ to a limit (u, v) with the properties $u \ge \underline{u}_k > 0$ and $v \ge \underline{v}_k > 0$. Being monotone and also using a standard regularity argument, $\{(u_n, v_n)\}$ converges itself to (u, v). Now, letting $n \to +\infty$ in (15), we deduce that (u, v) is a positive weak solution of system (1). The proof of theorem is now completed.

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
